Collins O. Airhihenbuwa, PhD, MPH, is a Professor and Head of the Department of Biobehavioral Health at the Pennsylvania State University. His research is on health and culture. He is a consultant to UN agencies including WHO, UNAIDS, UNFP, and an author of the PEN-3 model used to centralize culture in public health and health promotion projects. Dr. Airhihenbuwa has over 100 articles, book chapters, and books. His books include *Health and Culture: Beyond the Western Paradigm*; the *UNAIDS Communications Framework for HIV/AIDS: A New Direction*; and *Healing Our Differences: the Crisis of Global Health and the Politics of Identity*.

Dr. Airhihenbuwa chairs the Advisory Board of the Global Philanthropy Alliance which funds projects in South Africa, Kenya and Nigeria. He was a member of Board of Scientific Counselors of Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and is former President of the Society for Public Health Education (SOPHE). He has received the following honors; 2007 SOPHE Distinguished Fellow, 1998 Scholar of the Year by the American Association for Health Education, 2011 recipient of the Penn State Faculty Outreach Award, 2011 SOPHE Mentor award, Fellow of the American Academy of Health Behavior and the Academy of Behavioral Medicine Research.
