

- >> 2 million children live in families with at least one parent deployed in combat.
- >> 900,000 children live in families with multiple deployments.
- >> 50,000 children live in families where both parents have been deployed.

Military families bear a special burden during war time but the strain has been made more accute by multiple deployments and extended duty in the current conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. For families the strain can manifest itself in issues both at home and in the classroom.

This symposium, designed for psychologists, psychiatrists, first responders, licensed counselors, social workers, educators, child life specialists and others who work with children, will include dual keynote presentations from Dr. Peter Mansoor, a career Army veteran who led a brigade in Iraq, and Terri Tanielian, co-director of the RAND's Center for Military Health Policy Research. Her study of military families will be the cornerstone for the event's discussions. They will be joined by a group of local specialists who will further discuss these issues in co-current smaller group sessions.

First, Dr. Mansoor, a retired US Army colonel and Iraq veteran, will define the context and complexities of the current military actions in Iraq and Afghanistan. In these operations, our soldiers are expected to be sensitive to the cultural environment of the host country and its political leadership while building relationships with it citizens and finding and fighting insurgents. Dr. Mansoor will discuss how this type of conflict affects our soldiers on the battlefield and once they return home.

Second, Ms. Tanielian, co-director of the RAND's Center for Military Health Policy and Research will discuss her study of the war's impact on the families of veterans. Co-author of the widely regarded Invisible Wounds of War research recounting the difficulties faced by veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan, Ms. Tanielian recently completed research on the war's affects on families of the deployed soldiers. *Children on the Homefront: the Experience of Children from Military Families* was published by **Pediatrics**, the publication of the American Academy of Pediatrics in 2009. Ms. Tanielian recently completed a wider study, *Views from the Homefront; How Military Youth & Spouses are Coping with Deployment*.

Following the keynote presentations and a Q & A by Dr. Mansoor and Ms. Tanielian concurrent breakout sessions led by professionals will help participants:

- >> Identify at risk military families.
- >> Examine and understand the most recent research and clinical studies on the multiple stresses experienced by military families.
- >> Understand the unique dimensions and stresses of the current theaters of combat.

>> Understand the economic and societal costs associated with these issues for veterans and their families.

Participants will select three seminar sessions through the remainder of the day. The seminar will wrap up with a panel of veterans and family members moderated by former news anchor and Vietnam Veteran Thomas G. Sweeney.

Keynote: Peter Mansoor, PhD Colonel, US Army Retired, Chair of Military History, The Ohio State University The Nature of Counterinsurgency Warfare and Its Impact on American Soldiers

Dr. Mansoor is the General Raymond E. Mason Jr. Chair of Military History at The Ohio State University. He joined Ohio State in 2008 after a 26 year military career that culminated with his service as executive officer to General David Petraeus, Commanding General of the Multi-National Force, Iraq. He commanded the 1st Brigade, 1st Armored Division from 2003 until 2005 including 13 month of duty in Iraq. He served as senior fellow of the Council on Foreign Relations and as the founding director of the US Army/Marine Corps Counterinsurgency Center in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. An award-winning author, his most recent work is *Baghdad at Sunrise: A Brigade Commander's War in Iraq*.



Keynote: Terri Tanielian, Senior Research Analyst & Co-Director, Center for Military and Health Policy Research RAND Corporation

Terri Tanielian is the co-author of *Children on the Homefront: The Experience of Children from Military Families*. She is a senior social research analyst at the RAND Corporation where she also serves as the co-director of its Center for Military Health Policy Research. Her areas of study include the psychological and behavioral impact of combat, terrorism and disasters. She co-led the landmark study *Invisible Wounds of War* and is currently leading or contributing to studies of military deployment. Widely quoted in the national media, she has testified before Congress and briefed the Department of Defense, the Veterans Administration, Office of Health & Human Services as well as community forums across the nation. For more than 60 years, the RAND Corporation has pursued its nonprofit mission by conducting research on important and complicated problems.
