The relationships between aptitudes, abilities and personality development have been a large part of coming to understand what it is that constitutes human beings. Are intelligence and personality separate but equal life components? Is human intelligence, across its range of components, an integral part of personality? Or might it be that human intelligence in all its expressions, cannot come to be understood distinct from personality? These have been some of the philosophical debate and research questions requiring answers in our search

for the meanings of life. And the haunting "personality paradox" involved with gaining theoretical definitions of personality without valid and reliable predictions of behavior caused reconsiderations involving person-personality traits – environmental interactions.

No mainstream personality psychology has arisen which proposes that cognitiveintellectual factors are behind and support the developmental qualities of personality. **Gittinger's Personality Assessment System (PAS)**, in relatively quiet ways, resolved the personality paradox, described an intellectual basis to human personality, and effectively predicted human behavior in support of U.S national security. The **Personality Assessment System Foundation**, a professional, non-profit, educational and psychological non-governmental organization, proposes the Gittinger PAS to personality psychology through this particular conference. It is intended as a signature statement about human personality, a cognitive and developmental theory of personality and its three central applications.



The PAS utilizes observable behavior and/or psychological test data in the assessment process. Its primary value lies in the fact that it readily lends itself to use as a tool for the prediction of behavior."
