Matthew Chester-Griffin holds a B.G.S. in Musical Theater & Opera Performance and an M.F.A. in Acting, both from Ohio University. During his senior year, Matthew served a student internship with the English National Opera. He has appeared with the Wisconsin Shakespeare Festival, Players Theater of Columbus, Opera Columbus, Columbus Light Opera, The Kenley Players (as Ed Ames' understudy), The Honolulu Theater for Youth, The Pennsylvania Stage Company, The Derby Dinner Playhouse, and The Festival of Southern Theater at Ole Miss. For two seasons he was host of the Medora Musical in Medora, North Dakota.

Matthew has studied with Arthur Lessac and, as an assistant professor of theatre arts at the University of Mississippi, taught courses in Voice & Speech for the Stage, Acting, Musical Theater Performance, and Dialects for the Stage. He has also taught at Olivet College, The Ohio State University, and Ohio University.

Harolyn Brient has an extensive music background including 50 years as a private piano instructor and accompanist in the Ohio University School of Music. She has been active in the Ohio Valley Summer Theatre for 45 years, filling roles too numerous to list but including dinner theatre revues, music director and accompanist, and loyal board member. Harolyn was musical director and performed with the Monomoy Summer Theatre (1983-1986) and was a frequent guest artist/musical director at the University of Mississippi (1990-1994).

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT - Dru Riley Evarts

We are ready to begin serious planning for our one open meeting of the year. It is a time other than our monthly luncheon event that we have a special meeting for ourselves and anyone else who would like to attend (community people, active faculty and staff, students, etc.). George Weckman, who developed this idea during the spring quarter of the first year of his emeriti presidency (2011), has accepted the chairmanship of the committee to organize the open meeting during the late winter or early spring coming up.



Now in the second year of his emeriti board position as past president, George has suggested that we concentrate on the arts this time. The date has not yet been set, but will probably be in March. Subjects in other years were campus memories, a salute to the Ohio University Press, and a chat with PBS's Gwen Ifill.

The provost is now in her sixth year and reports that we continue to focus on serving our students. The university is in good health, with improvements in enrollment at all levels. There is also a special focus on first generation college students.

- 3. Health and Wellness, addressing public health, outreach to underserved populations, the art and science of health care delivery, and emerging and novel technologies.
- Vibrant Societies and Economies, investigating human capital, arts and culture as forces for economic prosperity, and entrepreneurship and economic development.



IN MEMORIAM

Richard Syracuse, 80, died suddenly on Friday, November 21. He received the bachelor and the master of science degrees from the Juilliard School of Music in New York City where he held the Josef Lhevinne, Frank Damrosch, and John Erskine scholarships. After initial music lessons with his father, his early studies were at



the Mannes College of Music with Mme. Vera Popova; at Juilliard he studied with two legendary piano teachers — Rosalyn Tureck and Mme. Rosina Lhevinne. A Fulbright Scholarship enabled Richard to study at the St. Cecilia Academy of Music in Rome, Italy, under Carlo Zecchi where he received an Artist Diploma.

Arriving on the campus of Ohio University in 1966, Richard taught applied piano, keyboard literature, and accompanying, in addition to maintaining an active career as a soloist, accompanist, chamber musician, and jazz musician. He was awarded the Professor Emeritus title when he "officially" retired in 2010. He continued to play and teach in various venues and was a local favorite at Cutler's Restaurant in the Ohio University Inn.

He is survived by his wife, Carole K. Cordray-Syracuse, a sister, four nephews, a niece, many great nieces and nephews, as well as a sizable group of extended family, friends, and colleagues.
