Kenneth H. Johnson, D.O., has extensive experience as a physician, teacher, and leader in national osteopathic medical education. He currently serves as chair of the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation (COCA), the vice chair of the American Osteopathic Association Bureau of Osteopathic Graduate Medical Education Development, past president of the American Academy of Osteopathy, and member of the Blue Ribbon Commission for the Advancement of Osteopathic Medical Education.

A 1992 graduate of the University of New England College of Osteopathic Medicine (UNECOM) in Maine, he is certified by the American Osteopathic Board of Family Physicians and the American Osteopathic Board of Neuromusculoskeletal Medicine. Johnson has held faculty positions at the University of Wyoming and Tufts University in Massachusetts and served as associate dean for educational programs, vice dean, and associate professor of family medicine at UNECOM. He is the previous chief medical officer of Health Access Network in Lincoln, Maine, and a former faculty member and director of Osteopathic Medical Education at the Eastern Maine Medical Center/UNECOM Family Practice Residency.

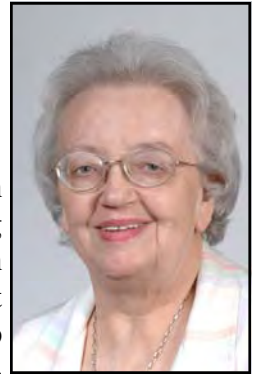

OHIO'S PUBLIC RETIREMENT FUNDS ARE SAFE

Public employees' state pension plans do well when they are properly funded and professionally managed, as well as overseen by boards of trustees under the jurisdiction of state and national governments, according to Hank Kim, executive director of the National Conference on Public Employee Retirement Systems.

Kim added that the vast majority of public pensions are well-rounded and are growing stronger as the economy continues to recover. The biggest challenge public pensions currently face is "receiving timely and full payments of annual required contributions by state and local governments," said Kim, pointing out that the public pension plans in trouble today are those whose state legislatures fail to fund them in a timely manner. For example, Illinois has more than \$111 billion of unfunded liability for government workers' pensions according to *Statista, Inc.* We are fortunate to be in Ohio where the public employees' pension funds have been well managed.

IN MEMORIAM

Ronald A. Black passed away Wednesday, January 29, 2015, at home. Black, professor emeritus of osteopathic medicine, was a graduate of Alma College and the University of Michigan. He worked at the University of Detroit, Delta College, Michigan State University, and the Ohio University College of Osteopathic Medicine.

Black was a member of First Presbyterian Church, where he was an elder, choir member, and worked on the College Lunch Crew. He also was a member of the Red Cross, Senior Beat, OU Emeriti Association, Council on Aging, Senior Club, Couples Bridge and the Visiting Nurses.

Ron is survived by his wife of 59 years, Mary Jane; his five children; nine grandchildren; and a great-grandchild.

Susan Kay Bullard, professor emerita in the College of Health Sciences and Professions' School of Applied Health Sciences and Wellness, passed away in Kalamazoo, Mich. on Friday, January 2, after a lengthy illness.



Bullard had both a bachelor's and master's degree in physical education and a Ph.D. in biomechanics. She joined the faculty of the School of Recreation and Sport Sciences as an assistant professor in 1990 and served as an OHIO faculty member for more than 20 years.

Sue was preceded in death by her father. Surviving are her mother and three sisters and their families.

Donald A. Lambert, professor emeritus of journalism, passed away on Saturday, January 3. A graduate of Pennsylvania State University, where he earned both a bachelor's degree and master's degree in journalism, Lambert served 18 months in the Army before joining the newsroom at the *Erie (Pa.) Morning News* in 1958. He spent nearly 10 years at the newspaper filling a variety of roles including the editorial page editor, a position that allowed him to frequently pen weekly and daily columns often focusing on government and/or humor.



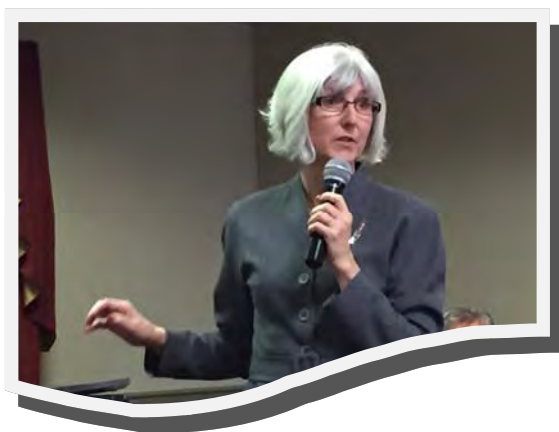
Lambert brought his passion for news and editorial writing as well as his sense of humor to Ohio University's E.W. Scripps School of Journalism, joining the faculty in 1967. Over the course of the next 30-plus years, Lambert taught hundreds of aspiring journalists in courses that included news writing, editorial writing, column writing, and journalism ethics. He retired in 2000 but continued to teach part-time for the next few years.

Don is survived by his wife of 48 years, Joyce, two daughters, Kathryn and Sarah, two grandsons, as well as other extended family.
