

**Merri Biechler** is a playwright, actor, educator, and the Managing Director of Brick Monkey Theater Ensemble, a professional theater company located in Southeast Ohio. She is the recipient of a 2014 Boomerang Fund for Artists award. Her plays include *Tammy Faye's Final Audition, An Appalachian Christmas Carol,* and *Confessions of a Reluctant Caregiver* which received grants totaling \$40,000 to use the play as a teaching tool for medical students. Merri received her MFA in playwriting from Ohio University. As an actor, Merri spent 18 months with the original Off-Broadway cast of *Tony'n Tina's Wedding*, appeared in the films *He Said, She Said; The Thing Called Love;* and *Pieces of April;* and guest-starred on episodes of *Judging Amy, E.R.*, and *Murphy Brown*.

**Shelley Delaney** heads the performance program in The Ohio University Division of Theater, is a founding member of Brick Monkey Theater Ensemble, and a member of the performing arts unions: Actors' Equity Association and SAG/AFTRA. Regional theater acting credits include The McCarter Theatre, Bay Street, Cincinnati Playhouse, Victory Gardens (Joseph Jefferson nomination for *Free Man of Color*), GeVa, Cleveland Playhouse, Capital Rep, Delaware Theatre Company, Virginia Stage, Pittsburgh Irish and Classical Theatre, Two River, Dorset Theatre Festival, and Florida Rep. New York theaters include La Mama, the Ohio, EST, HERE, Circle Rep Lab, and many others. Shelley directs regularly on the OU main stage, and directed *An Appalachian Christmas Carol* at Stuart's Opera House for two consecutive years.

### Notes on February's Luncheon Presentation by Tom O'Grady "THE STORY OF THE OHIO CANALS"

The completion of the Erie Canal, connecting New York City to Lake Erie in 1825, led Ohio to follow New York's lead. Governor Clinton broke ground for the Ohio canal system in July 1825. The first leg, the Ohio and Erie Canal system, 309 miles long, was completed in 1832. The system strengthened trade to New York on the east and south to New Orleans. It was extended to Nelsonville in 1840 and reached Athens in 1843. The development of an extensive railroad system toward the end of the 19th century doomed the canal system. In 1940, the portion of the canal through Nelsonville was filled in and is now known as Canal St. *Ed Baum*

## **IN MEMORIAM**

Eugene Jennings, 92, passed away on February 1, at his home in Falls Church, VA. Gene was born in the small Kansas farming town of Arnold and grew up the youngest of three boys during the Depression. Blessed with perfect pitch, Gene showed a talent through childhood for the



piano. When he left for Kansas University in 1941 it was to get a degree in music.

World War II interrupted Gene's studies at KU. His 1946 junior piano recital was, coincidentally, attended by John Baker, then the president of Ohio University. On the spot Baker offered him a professorship at OU, once Gene finished his degree.

After graduating Gene moved to Athens in 1949. In 1959 Gene earned a Ph.D. in piano at FSU. There he met a young harpist named Lucile High. They married after a whirlwind courtship that summer. He brought her back to Athens and they settled permanently, raising a family while both teaching at OU's School of Music. Gene retired in 1994.

Gene was preceded in death by Lucille and a son, Eric. He is survived by his sons Chris and Tom and their families.


