He previously served as dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Iowa; before that he served as a Distinguished Professor and Chair of the Physics Department at the University of South Carolina. Prior to South Carolina he was a Tenured Research Scientist at IPN-Orsay, France. His BS and MA degrees in physics are from the University of Paris XI, and he has a doctorate in nuclear physics from IPN-Orsay in Paris and a These d'Etat (post-doctoral degree) with highest honors from IPN-Orsay. Dr. Djalali is a member of the TREK collaboration at the Japan Proton Accelerator Research Complex (JPARC) and a member of the CLAS Collaboration at the Continuous Electron Beam Accelerator Facility/Thomas Jefferson National Facility in Newport News, Virginia. He will speak on the progress made toward Ohio University's four Strategic Pathways, ways in which the university is supporting scholarly activity, retention and success initiatives, and the One OHIO concept.

OBITUARIES

JOHNSON

Allen Monroe Johnson died April 21, 2019. He attended the University of North Carolina on a baseball scholarship and had a brief stint as a semi-professional pitcher in North Carolina, then went on to Appalachian State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and social studies, followed by a Master's degree in secondary education and social studies. His doctorate in education was from the University of Tennessee.

He served two years in the Army in Korea, was selected for advanced leadership school and graduated top in the class. He was picked to form the instructional staff of the advanced leadership school with the responsibility of teaching. Monroe was a member of the Fort Jackson (South Carolina) honor guard and color guard and the battalion's performance drill team.

He joined Ohio University in 1963 as coordinator of student teaching programs in Cleveland, then moved to the Athens campus in 1966. He taught undergraduate courses in secondary education programs and graduate courses in secondary school curriculum theory and instructional supervision. He directed the nationally funded Upward Bound at OU and the urban field experience.

Instrumental in gaining approval of the first middle school teacher certification program in Ohio, he finally saw the middle school certification program offered in the OU catalog of courses in 1984. The program grew to include master's degree and doctoral divisions.

Described by his students as creative, an initiator, motivating, and a great storyteller, Dr. Johnson greatly enjoyed interacting with undergraduate and graduate students, American and international students alike.

After retiring from full-time teaching in 1995, Monroe enjoyed surf-fishing in Florida, carpentry, landscaping, storytelling, traveling and dancing. He is survived by a daughter, three grandchildren and a great grandchild. Memorial gifts may be made to your local Hospice Chapter. A memorial service was held in late April in Mebane, North Carolina, where Dr. Johnson is buried near his parents, his wife and son.
