The field of book history is vital and expanding, an interdisciplinary pursuit that studies how printed texts were made, distributed, and consumed. In an increasingly digital era, issues that have over centuries shaped the development of the book and the experience of reading as we know it—changes in technologies of producing and consuming texts, shifting understandings of authorship and audience—also inform our understanding of how electronic texts in their various forms function in a radically and rapidly changing media ecology.

We'll study this evolution of the book through hands on experience in Alden Library's Archives and Special Collections. We will examine manuscripts, early printed books, and related materials; we'll explore the art and craft of books historically and consider the new forms and media book arts have taken in the twenty-first century. We'll consider such topics as illustration, structure, typography, bindings, provenance, and what we can learn from marginalia and other marks of ownership and usage that make each copy of a book its own unique artifact.

Our goal is to provide knowledge and spark ideas that teachers, librarians, and public historians can use to study and teach whatever unique collections they have available in their homes and communities. This will be a highly "hands on" learning experience.
